Why this Project?

•The MASC / MAHS Executive Board came up with the idea to do a Technology 4 Teens drive due to the high number of teens around the state with a lack of access to technology.

•Teens around the state may have access to technology in school but not necessarily out of school at home.

•With technology use on the rise it is necessary for all teens to have access to computers, calculators, and cell phones outside of school for personal, academic, and emergency use.

What are the facts?

•In the U.S. over 80% of households with an income of greater than \$30,000 (36.6 million) have a home computer

•Only 37% of households with an income under \$30,000 own a PC.

•This leaves about 10 million low

income homes in the U.S. computerless

•In Hennepin County it is estimated that there are over 140,000 people without a computer

•84% of teens (ages 15-18) own a cell phone

•In 2012 there were over

400,000 emergency 911 calls

NASC National Conference



This summer 39 students and 10 advisers attended the National Association of Student Councils conference in Las Vegas, Nevada. The delegation flew out to Las Vegas on Thursday, June 20th and enjoyed all of Friday on the strip exploring and having a good time. Come Friday, the delegates got down to business. The conference went from Saturday to Monday starting at 6:45 in the morning. There was daily transportation out to the high school on the edge of Vegas where the conference was held. The delegates attended dozens of sessions throughout the conference ranging from small group to full general assembly meetings where all the delegates participated with phenomenal keynote speakers.

The delegates got to spend a lot of time working with other students from around the country to better their councils and improve on their leadership skills. In small group workshops delegates may have been learning unique and fun icebreakers or even learning how to raise money for people around the world. The entire conference offered the students time to really explore the world of student council and gain knowledge and experience about what it's like to live in a different part of the country.

On the final day of the conference the delegates had to pack up and head on out. There was a half-day final assembly where departing words were said, and then the delegates were off to the strip to spend their last few hours. Before heading to the airport to go home everyone was able to go to the Fashion Show mall where they could buy souvenirs or just spend some time on the strip. Once everyone arrived at the airport there was quite a bit of time to spend waiting for the airplane and there were quite a few people who got a few hours of sleep in before the plane arrived. The flight home was quiet considering most people were sleeping but overall the students and advisers had an amazing time and learned a lot.



Summer Leadership Academy



Towards the end of the summer around 100 student council members from around the state attended the Summer Leadership Academy in St. Cloud. The conference was on August 4th and 5th. The first day of the conference consisted of the members meeting with different local speakers from around the state. The speakers led small group workshops where the students were able to learn about how to improve their school and themselves on a smaller scale. The first day of the conference was at Sauk Rapids-Rice High School, which allowed for many small breakout rooms to work in small groups. After the small group workshops the students were given a playing card and that card decided which groups they were in for the next activity. For the next part of the conference the delegates got into small groups and talked about different topics for around 5 minutes at a time and then they would switch groups. This activity allowed the students to hear about what other schools around the state are like and how they operate.

After all the activities had concluded at the school the delegates returned to the hotel in St. Cloud where they were treated to a dance party, volleyball, and swimming for the rest of the night. The delegates were given a lot of time to socialize and really get to know each other and build connections that will help them throughout the year.

The next morning Doug Erickson led a presentation for about an hour that helped you realize how important and individual each and every person is. Doug showed everyone little tricks and games that the student could play with his or her friends. The delegates took the Dalai Lama Personality test to see what your personality really is. After this final activity everyone went his or her separate ways until next time at the Leadership Forum in November!
