Have a district wide coat, hat, and mittens drive, encourage friends and family to save unused shampoo, conditioner, and soap from hotels, or donate that extra toothbrush your dentist gives you! There are hundreds of different and unique ways to approach this project and we'd love to hear your school's plans!
